SERVICES FOR ANG. MARTINO HELD MONDAY

Funeral services over the remains of the late Angelo Martino, of Brockway, were held Monday morning in the St. Tobias church, at Brockway, with Requiem High Mass being said by Father Thomas J. Kennedy. Interment was made in the Martino family mausoleum at Reynoldsville.

Mr. Martino passed away in the DuBois hospital Friday morning at 2:00 a. m., as the result of injuries sustained in a fall on November 19. He was brought to the local hospital at that time and was found to have suffered a fractured hip. He failed to rally from the hip injury and general shock to his nervous system, and grew steadily worse until his end came at the time stated.

The death of Mr. Martino came as a distinct shock to friends in the Brockway community where he had been a highly respected resident for the past 44 years.

Angelo Martino was born in Troia, Province of Foggia, Italy, August 28, 1854. He came to America in 1885, landing in New York and without a friend in this country. After searching for work for six months he was finally employed by the Lackawanna R. R. Company of Buffalo, N. Y. After a few months John Ross, of Brockway went to Buffalo to get laborers for the Blue Rock saw mill. Mr. Martino was one of the laborers and followed up the lumbering business for two and one-half years, finally moving to Brockway where he was employed on the Erie railroad section. Then he moved to Mead Run where he engaged, in mining. In 1890 he sent to Italy for his family which consisted of his wife and two children, Mrs. Antonio De Santis and Carol Martino, of Brockway.

In 1894 the family moved to Brockway and in 1898 moved back to Shawmut. In 1903 the family moved to Pardus, where Mr. Martino engaged in the grocery business with his son, Carlo. In 1914 he moved to Indiana where, for eight years, he was employed by the Indiana Macaroni Company. In 1922 he moved back to Brockway where he resided until death.

His wife preceded him in death in 1918. He is survived by the following

children: Mrs. Antonio DeSantis, of Brockway; Carlo Martino, Brockway; Mrs. Gaspar Tronzo, of Punxsutawney; Joe Martino, of Brockway, and Mrs. Domenic Tortarella, of Ravenna, Ohio. Two sisters also survive him, Mrs. Luigi Ingaldi, of Erie, and Mrs. Joe Tambourino, of Orenshaw, and thirty grandchildren.
